## Manager's Report

It's been a very busy summer for the park this year. I would like to start off with the Codorus Blast. I'm humbled and very thankful for all the volunteers who came forward and made the festival a complete success. Our park rangers estimated we had over 30,000 people attend the event. We did not have any bad incidents and have received many good comments on the event. I'm gathering and listening to everyone's ideas for next year's event. The Friends' Board and I will have to have more meetings to discuss and determine the size and the type of event for next year.

The next big park program has been the pool. We have had a few days of over capacity crowds. With this hot weather everybody loves to swim. The park's kayak and pontoon programs have gotten larger and busier as the season progresses. A big thank you to the maintenance staff for grass mowing and trash removal. Rainy weather makes the grass grow all the time. The litter is driving me crazy. I have tried many, many ideas to get people to stop littering in the park. Any ideas on how to control it, please give me a call. A big thank you to our park rangers.

Park Staff Update:

New park maintenance supervisor, Dave Hoffman, has started at the park.

Park Project Update:

We have a new expression in the park from Memorial Day to Labor Day. It's called "BMT", for Bathrooms, Mowing and Trash. It has been very busy work for the maintenance crews.

Mill House - A new roof has been installed. Plans are in progress for

the ADA bathroom and regular bathroom.

Tree Work - The second phase of the hazardous tree removal has been finished in the park.

Storm Damage - Debris from storm damaged trees is being cleared

as necessary.

Road Crack Repair - Additional tar crack repair work will be contracted out this summer.

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Door Repair - Doors need to be replaced and/or repaired at the swimming pool, band shell, and classroom building.

Park Vista - Trees need to be cut back for a lake view.

Codorus Blast, 2013

Boats, dogs, and people filled Lake Marburg and the shoreline for the 2013 Codorus Blast: Festival in the Park. During the 3-day event, the park hosted thousands of visitors. Also involved were over 100 vendors, triathlon participants, and reenactors, plus about 100 volunteers who gave many hours to make it all happen. 

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## Charcoal Burn

In the early days of our country, charcoal was used to smelt iron in 18<sup>th</sup> century hot blast furnaces. Charcoal was, at the time, the most efficient source of fuel before the use of anthracite coal. One acre of woods per day were turned into charcoal. Charcoaling created the need for the management of our renewable resources, specifically our forests, due to the large amounts of timber that were being consumed. This was the beginning of our conservation and natural resource management.

Colliers were the men who oversaw this charcoaling process. On September 14<sup>th</sup> and 15<sup>th</sup>, we are going to recreate this process thanks to Paul Fagley, a collier from Greenwood Furnace, with assistance from an Eagle Scout and several of his troop members.

We will need many volunteers, along with the supplies needed to complete the "burn". Anyone with questions or offers of help should contact Wendy Looker at the Park Office.
